

Heat-Related Illness Surveillance 2008 Ends

Surveillance for heat-related illnesses and deaths ended September 27, 2008. This summer, there were a total of 86 cases of heat-related illness, which included heat syncope, heat fatigue, heat cramps, and heat exhaustion reported by Imperial County hospitals. This is slightly lower than 94 cases reported in 2007. The number of heat stroke cases remained the same as last year with a total of 13 cases.

Environmental hyperthermia was responsible for a total of six deaths in Imperial County this summer. Of the 6 deaths, four were undocumented immigrants from Mexico. Last year ten deaths were reported, and seven of these were undocumented immigrants.
