

Heat-Related Illness Surveillance

From June 2, 2019 to September 7, 2019, a total of 251 heat-related illnesses and five deaths were reported by local hospitals and the County Coroner. The median age for heat-related illness is 38 years (range: 1 to 96 years), and 76% were male.

Out of 21 cases diagnosed with heat stroke, 11 (52.4%) are persons aged 50 years and older.

The severity of heat-related disorders tends to increase with age. Conditions that cause heat cramps in a 17-year-old person may result in heat exhaustion in someone 40 years old, or heat stroke in a person over 50 years of age. The elderly need to take extra precautions to avoid a heat-related illness.

Heat Index: 80-89°F	Heat Effect: Fatigue is possible with prolonged exposure and/or physical activity Recommendations: Limit your time outdoors; stay well hydrated



Heat index, sometimes referred to as the apparent temperature and given in degrees Fahrenheit, is a measure of how hot it really feels when relative humidity is factored with the actual air temperature.
